Thematic frame: Globally spreading digitization is rearranging the relationship between diverse actors in our societies and decision-making processes. On the political level, today's Internet environment is increasingly controlled, surveilled and weaponized, with repercussions in public and private spheres both online and offline. The economic sector is readapting its production patterns, and even influencing the very nature of the monetary system. In spite of efforts, competitiveness, sustainability and fair division of labor are still not synonyms. At the same time, (social) media has become an unprecedented tool for democratization of political decision-making, and digital platforms have established a dynamic space for collaborative approaches in post-growth economies.

The role of Federated States in the digital diplomacy

A situation room is a place where government officials gather in times of crisis to collect information and coordinate activities. Inspired by this example, it is a location designed for debate and discussion, rather than for command and control. It is an atelier politique, an information centre and a meeting place for decision makers, artists, students, analysts and journalists.

During the Open Situation Room in Montreal, participants will tackle digital diplomacy challenges which Global Affairs Canada and Quebec's ministry of foreign relations face in their daily operations and policy planning. The thematic focus will lay on how to better collaborate across institutional and national boarders, and how to design programs and methods that go "beyond hashtags" to have greater impact in the digital and analog world.

The aim is to explore existing innovative examples of international cooperation from different topic areas (trade, humanitarian, environmental, security issues) and across different groups (national, local governments, business associations, foundations, and grass roots groups), and to identify the instruments, processes and skills that make their cooperation a success.

In short: What can traditional diplomats and other international actors learn from each other? How can they cooperate towards mutually desirable outcomes?
